Career and Technical Education Corner

At this time of year, we look at the blessings we have and give thanks for those blessings.

As we give thanks, do we think of those blessings and how we obtained them? Do we think of the barriers to those blessings that so many face? Do we think through the skills we have acquired and the experiences, opportunities and people we have encountered that allowed for those skills?

As we think of Career and College Readiness in Manitou Springs School District, we work to enable students to achieve these opportunities.

In October, MSSD14 paid for all of its eighth through 11th grade students to take the PSAT test for their grade level. This allows students to begin practicing for the college entrance exam years before they take the SAT.

Students can then create a Khan Academy account linked to their scores for free. This account takes their strengths and weaknesses and creates a tutorial for them to practice.

These tests and the Khan Academy platform allows for all our students to have equal access to opportunity after high school. It begins to break down barriers to success

for students who may have thought, "college isn't for me."

A student may use these scores at any four or two-year college in Colorado for entrance and placement. This includes classes for an associate's degree, or an industry certificate/credential program at a two-year school like Pikes Peak Community College.

Teachers in the middle school and high school use this data in both individual and whole group data conversations, concerning skills and growth.

People, skills and opportunities — three things to be thankful for this season in Manitou Springs.

Dear Manitou Springs Community, It's with a heavy heart I inform you of the passing of a wonderful person and the first principal of our lovely little school, Anne Foster. Mrs. Foster was deeply loved by many in our community as she served both Ute Pass Elementary and Manitou Springs Elementary as a teacher and a principal. She served as UPE's principal for 15 years and served MSES for another 10 years afterward. A pioneering Mustang community leader has left us.

At our 50th Anniversary Gala event last August, which she attended, the community was able to honor Mrs. Foster for her precious years of service. 50 years ago this fall, Mrs. Foster introduced 10 teachers as the school's first faculty of **Ute Pass Elementary**

School: Miss Gralapp, Mrs. Van Kirk, Miss Johnson, Mr. Vaeth, Mrs. Longenecker, Mrs. Elva Warner, Mrs. Thomson, Mrs. Heltemes, Mrs. Quinn and the school's first secretary, Mrs. Porter; with a cumulative experience of 114 years!

Mrs. Foster represents for us the vision and the shoulders of a whole community upon which all these traditions and 50 amazing years of learning have been

based. The Profundity of "Tiny": During her opening remarks at the Dedication Ceremony in November 1969, Mrs. Foster said, "we are a small school, but we offer many exceptional special services." With those words, and through the work of these founding teachers, Ute Pass Elementary established a priority around the idea that you can do even bigger things for children and families when your school is really, really small.

During the gala celebration, I saw a former student hug Mrs. Foster and

say, "I love you. You will always be my principal."To which she replied, "I love you too."That kind of love, 50 years later, is the legacy and the standard of excellence we all strive to achieve each and every day at this little village school.

Anne. She shared a lot of wisdom about our school with many across the years. As the school's sixth principal. I bonded with Anne during her last few years and will miss her a lot. Anne, Ute Pass Elementary School will always live the legacy you have left us. Thank you for being in so many people's lives.
